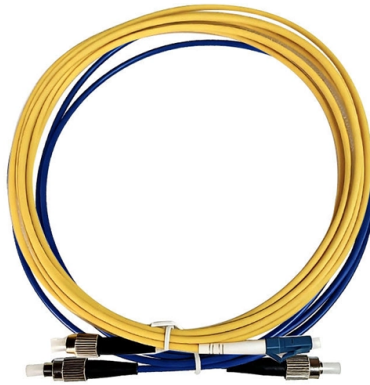


AP access switch cannot learn MAC address

How Switches Work: MAC Address Table Explained

A switch with an empty MAC address table behaves like a hub: the first frame it ever sees gets copied out every port. Seconds later it stops doing that, because it has started learning.

Catalyst switches not learning MAC addresses

Once that happens, the switch reporting the loop stops trying to learn the MAC address that it sees as looping. That switch floods the traffic from that device to all ports.

Why am I not see thing MAC addresses of the devices plugged in?

It looks like the APs are working because ports 1 and 20 show multiple mac addresses which means that either another switch is connected to that port or an AP with wireless clients. Try
