

Can any switch be used as a core switch

Practical Considerations Not all switches are designed for core use. For example, Layer 2 switches like the Cisco Catalyst 2960X are generally unsuitable for core deployment because they lack routing capabilities and high throughput. In contrast, Layer 3 switches such as the Cisco Catalyst 3560G or 3650 can be used as core switches in smaller networks, though they may be insufficient for very large or high-traffic environments. Enterprise-grade core switches, such as the Cisco Catalyst 9K series, are optimized for high-capacity backbone roles and support advanced features like VLAN routing, DHCP relay, and stacking.

Network Size and Architecture

- Small Networks (150 devices):** A dedicated enterprise core switch is recommended to prevent bottlenecks and ensure reliable backbone performance.
