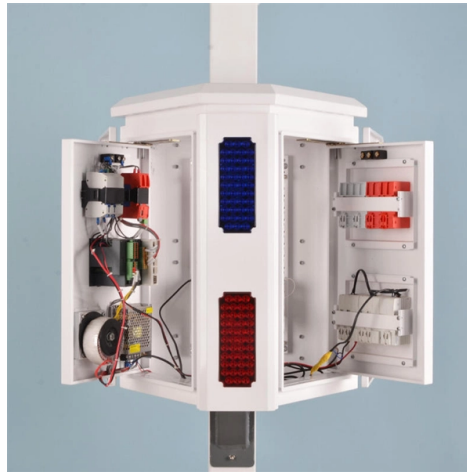


Can high-voltage and low-voltage wires be run in the same cable tray

Code and Regulatory Guidelines The National Electrical Code (NEC) generally requires separation of high-voltage and low-voltage circuits unless specific conditions are met. For low-voltage systems under 1000 V, if all cables are insulated for the maximum voltage present (commonly 600 V), they may be run in the same conduit or tray. For systems exceeding 1000 V, a physical barrier is required to isolate lower-voltage circuits from high-voltage circuits. NEC Article 300.3(C) and Article 725 provide guidance on when Class 1, 2, or 3 circuits can share a raceway, emphasizing that insulation and wiring methods must be rated for the highest voltage present.

Practical Considerations Even if code allows certain exceptions, best practice is to keep high-voltage and low-voltage wiring physically separated. Many manufacturers and installers recommend separate conduits or trays to avoid interference and simplify maintenance. Fiber optic cables are an exception, as they can safely run alongside high-voltage conductors if non-metallic. Temporary or short runs may sometimes be tolerated, but long-term installations should adhere strictly to separa...
