Manufacturer Recommendations: Always follow the tray manufacturer's guidance for vertical support spacing, as different designs (ladder, solid-bottom, or mesh) have varying load capacities.

Intermediate Supports: Even if a tray is self-supporting, intermediate brackets may be needed to secure cables within the tray and prevent lateral movement.

Environmental Factors: Outdoor installations or areas subject to wind, vibration, or seismic activity may require additional supports regardless of tray type.
