1. Not inspecting distribution boxes upon arrival

2. Inadequate protective earthing
Using undersized or improperly connected protective earth (PE) conductors can lead to electric shock hazards. All PE wires must connect to a dedicated busbar, with cross-sectional areas meeting or exceeding the largest branch circuit conductor.
3. Using untreated or non-flame-retardant wood
Wooden distribution boxes without flame-retardant treatment are prone to rotting, leakage, and fire hazards, especially in humid or dusty environments. Even in dry areas, wooden enclosures must be flame-retardant.
4. Insecure or incorrect installation
Boxes not mounted firmly, at incorrect heights, or with gaps in flush-mounted installations can affect functionality and aesthetics. Recommended heights are 1.5 m for the bottom of lighting distribution boxes and 1.8 m for panels, with vertical deviation not exceeding 3 mm.
5. Improper wire sizing and connections
Using wires with diameters that do not meet load requirements, failing to follow color coding, or leaving connections loose can cause overheating, short circuits, or equipment malfunction.
6. Disorderly or unbound wiring
Messy wiring inside the box can hinder maintenance, increase the risk of short circuits, and reduce overall safety. Wires should be neatly arranged and secured.
