Installation Practices Cables in trays must be securely fastened to maintain spacing, prevent sagging, and segregate different types of cables when necessary . Vertical and horizontal installations are both acceptable, but vertical trays may allow cables to hang if not tied down, while horizontal runs may require tie-downs to meet spacing and ampacity requirements . Adequate clearance around trays is essential for installation and maintenance, typically 12 to 18 inches between stacked trays and the ceiling . Tray Types and Fill Rules Cable trays come in several configurations: Ladder Tray: Open design with side rails and rungs, ideal for power cables and heavy loads, providing excellent ventilation . Ventilated Trough Tray: Solid bottom with ventilation slots, suitable for medium-voltage cables or areas needing debris protection . Solid-Bottom Tray: Fully enclosed, offering maximum protection from debris or liquids but with more restrictive fill rules due to heat dissipation concerns . Fill limits vary by cable type and tray design, and exceeding these limits can cause overheating or maintenance difficulties .
